


4-H MONTHLY UPDATE

Happy July!

4-H International Exchange Program

Did you know??? There are three branches of the 4-H International Exchange Program. The most common is the short-term one-month summer inbound program. This allows youth, most commonly from Japan, to visit our state and experience American family life to better develop English language skills. The goal is establishing a friendship, not being a tourist. The participants in this program are usually from ages 12-18. The yearlong high school program is a traditional exchange student design. A young person from abroad comes to stay with a family for ten months while they attend a local high school. The least common by no means least fun opportunity is the summer outbound program. Each year kids from across the country travel to another country for a month in the summer to experience their unique culture and live with a host family.

Families do not need to be 4-H Families to participate in the exchange.

Summer Inbound Program—July 24-August 15.

Host families do not need to be 4-H affiliated nor vaccinated for Covid 19

Families need a youth in the home within three years of age and of the same gender as the visitor.

The goal of this exchange is a cultural experience and English immersion, not tourism and site seeing.

The delegates want to stay with a family and experience your life with you.

Here are the delegates still looking for placements

Takeru, male, age 14—Takeru enjoys the outdoors, camping, hiking, reading books, animals, watching baseball and classical music. He is patient, tolerant, serious and quiet. His favorite hobbies are baseball, basketball, camping, hiking, reading and photography. Takeru would really like to go camping with his host family, watch a baseball game, play baseball and take pictures of nature. He would like to share his origami and calligraphy too.

Kizuki, male, age 15—Kizuki enjoys the outdoors, reading books, animals and watching TV (mystery, suspense and detective dramas). He is considerate of others, loves to laugh, cheerful, serious and honest. He enjoys soccer, baseball and badminton. Kazuki likes gummy candy, playing soccer or baseball in the park, playing card games (especially Pokémon and uno) and shopping. He wants to learn more about culture and be a member of his host family.

Kota, male, age 15—Kota enjoys watching sports, arts/crafts, painting/drawing and the outdoors. He is considerate of others, talkative, tidy and loves to laugh. Kota is working hard on his English skills so he can communicate with his host family. He enjoys playing rugby, watching baseball and playing electronic games. Kota does have ADHD but it is controlled with medication.

Yearlong High School Program

Families do not need children in the home nor be affiliated with 4-H.

One family hosts the entire hosting period (August-June)

May host two delegates as long as they are from different countries

A wonderful opportunity to experience another culture and share your life.

Young people come from various partner organizations. Some of the Korean delegates are traveling through the Korean 4-H program. Others are part of cultural or youth organizations.

Seongyeong, Female age 16, South Korea(BFE)—Seongyeong is an active teenager with a bright personality who likes outdoor activities and playing music. She was a member of student council last year, and also did Taekwondo for 6 years. She is looking forward to sharing Korean culture with her host family, particularly K-Pop.

Eunseo Female age 16, South Korea (KOR 4-H)—Eunseo is outgoing and independent. She participates in many clubs at her school, including student council, band, and broadcasting. She also likes sports, and does horse-back riding and home workout videos. In America, Eunseo wants to join school clubs, make friends, and build a relationship with her host family. She is looking forward to growing her world perspective and confidence through this exchange program.

Jaerin, Female age 17, South Korea (KOR 4-H)—Jaerin describes herself as patient and friendly, with a good sense of humor. She enjoys spending time with friends, eating Korean food, and watching movies. In the future, Jaerin wants to be a production director. She is looking forward to her exchange experience and sharing her bright personality with her host family.

Subeen, Female age 16, South Korea (KOR 4-H)—Subeen attends a foreign language high school in South Korea. She is very active and enjoys archery, horse-back riding, and table tennis. Subeen describes herself as relaxed, flexible, and outgoing. Subeen's dream is to be an international educator. She hopes to help prepare herself for this job by better understanding other people's cultures and education system during her exchange year.

Hana, Female 17, Japan (Labo)—Hana enjoys listening to music, painting, and singing. She belongs to the drama club at school and describes herself as active, adaptable, and cheerful. Hana did a month-long homestay in the United States when she was 12, and is looking forward to building a bond with her host family, improving her English, and sharing her love of calligraphy.

Mayu, female 18, Japan (LEX)—Mayu is interested in design and likes to express herself through art and painting. She also makes accessories such as rings, bracelets, and necklaces. In school, she has played on the soccer club for many years. Mayu’s parents describe her as gentle and caring, with a strong sense of justice. After seeing her sister travel on an exchange, Mayu now also wants to have a similar experience to build her confidence, English fluency, and create life-long memories with her host family.

Niko, Female 15, Japan (LEX)—Niko loves sports, especially playing and watching soccer. She is excited to join a soccer club in the US and also wants to try new sports that aren’t available in Japan. Niko also enjoys fashion, cooking and watching movies. She describes herself as cheerful, enthusiastic, and open. Her teachers say that she is very kind and trustworthy, with many friends. In the future, Niko would love to be a sports journalist.

--BOYS--

Saya, male 16, South Korea (KOR 4-H)—Saya enjoys listening to music, drawing pictures, and playing the piano. His favorite subjects are science, music, and English. When he grows up, Saya wants to be an evolutionary biologist. Saya is looking forward to meeting his host family and learning everything he can about American culture.

Hiroki, male 17, Japan (LEX)—Hiroki is a member of the track and field club and English debate club at his school, where he discusses social issues and learns about others’ perspectives. In his free time, Hiroki enjoys karaoke, calligraphy, and going on road trips with his family. Hiroki is excited to experience major US holidays with his host family like Christmas and Thanksgiving. He appreciates the importance of volunteering and would like to become involved in many volunteer activities.

Taisei, male 16, Japan (LEX)—Taisei is very active and participates in track and field at his school. His favorite subjects are science, math and English. His parents describe Taisei as ‘an honest boy with a wonderful smile.’ He studies hard, likes to exercise, and helps with all the family chores. In America, Taisei would love to go camping with his host family, which is one of his favorite activities.

Takumi, male 16, Japan (LEX)—Takumi is a very outgoing boy with a great sense of humor. He is a member of the badminton club, and also goes snowboarding with his father. In junior high, he joined student council and gained many leadership skills. In his free time, Takumi enjoys karaoke, bowling, and cooking. His parents describe him as ‘smart, responsible, and always eager to do everything.’ He is eager to meet his host family, build a deep bond, and improve his English skills.

Summer Outbound Program 2023

Each summer, American youth travel to several countries for one month. These cultural immersion trips mirror our inbound summer program. Current participating countries include Costa Rica, Japan, Norway, Taiwan, Romania, and Argentina.
